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# Jack Hoskins & his family

"Jack didn't have the best start in life and spent much of his first 12 months in and out of Great Ormond Street Hospital in London. Then to top it off, at nine months of age he contracted Meningitis. He was one of the lucky ones though and survived with only disturbed balance and a loss of hearing.

"Jack's hearing loss was initially devastating, with the regret of all the things he will never hear. But we have learned to embrace the challenge of adapting all our lives to appreciate sounds in a new way. As a family we have joined local groups and met a wealth of people, both professionals and new friends and feel that we have expanded our way of life rather than narrowed it. We are learning sign language together and encouraging Jack to listen and speak too so he can get the best of both worlds.

"A year after losing his hearing, Jack was fitted with bilateral cochlear implants. He was slow to show much response with them initially, but over the last six months

has really come on leaps and bounds with his response to hearing sounds, and identifying noises and even trying to repeat noises to make speech. What has happened in the last six months to spark this change? ... six months ago Jack started attending The Elizabeth Foundation!

"The facilities they offer and the expertise of the staff are amazing and clearly Jack thinks so too, so it is well worth the 120 mile round trip each week.

"Earlier this year I asked my friends to support me in running the Brighton Marathon for The Elizabeth Foundation for giving Jack a brighter future. I was not a runner before and last winter's "delightful" weather did nothing to encourage me off my warm comfy sofa! And quite frankly the thought of running 26 miles terrified me!! However, I successfully completed the course and raised over £1,000 to support The Elizabeth Foundation's amazing work. Some of my friends (including Jack's godfather Matt Goddard see below) have also taken on their own tough challenges to raise money."

"My godson Jack Hoskins (see above) has been benefiting significantly from the work of The Elizabeth Foundation over the past year, following being fitted with bilateral cochlear implants.

"As a result, my good friend Dave Jones and I wanted to complete a significant challenge to support the work of the charity. Despite not being cyclists, we chose riding the Lon Las route, a trail covering the full length of Wales in one weekend, and totally unsupported.

"Due to path closures and the odd mistake, the route totalled 469km both on and off road, climbing over 17,800ft as we crossed the three mountain ranges of Snowdonia, the Cambrian Mountains and the Brecon Beacons. Each day was around 8-10 hours on the bike, and the weather turned for the worse on day 3, with 5 hours of driving rain to see us on the final leg into Cardiff. However, at 9pm on day 3 we reached Cardiff having set off from Holyhead, with tired bodies, but happy hearts. And we raised over £3,000 including Gift Aid!"



### Running for Riley



Following hot on the heels of Jack's mum (see previous page), Tyler Coombes completed the Brighton Marathon in 4 hours 29 mins. Tyler is godfather to Riley, who attends our pre-school nursery.

Tyler says, "It was a terrific day. The support on the streets, at home and via social media has been overwhelming! Thoughts of The Elizabeth Foundation and the amazing work that it has done to help out Riley, and many others, inspired me".

Tyler wrote this beautiful story to inspire his friends to support him, and we were so moved by it that we'd like to share it with all of you:

"Christmas eve.

The usual last-minute dashing around to see friends and family. A bag of presents for the children under the arm.

Next stop; the Hall's residence.

'What have you got there?', my (nearly) 3 year old godson Riley excitedly asks. It stops me in my tracks. A brief pause. I answer, 'What do you think I have, Riley?' 'Presents?', eyes beginning to widen.

'Maybe...'

'Who are they for?'

'Have a guess'

As an appreciative, broad grin begins to develop, 'Are they for...me!?!'

A scene that won't seem too unfamiliar to most people. But the truth of the situation is that this brief interaction turned out to be a present for me. The greatest gift I could ever have received.

Riley Jackson Hall was born profoundly deaf. As soon as he was old enough, he was fitted with cochlear implants.

This was the first time that I had heard him speak. The first time I saw him listen. We had a conversation. A spoken conversation! It felt like a miracle.

'Merry Christmas', I thought.

On Christmas eve, I experienced something that felt like a miracle. The Elizabeth Foundation's dedicated and generous work has been fundamental in preparing Riley for what we all hope will be a unhindered life ahead. I want to say a massive 'THANK YOU' to those responsible. Running the Brighton Marathon is my way of doing so."

## News from our Family Centre

#### It has been such an exciting year in the nursery here at The Elizabeth Foundation.

In January, we welcomed Charlotte Smith to our team. Charlotte is a Speech and Language Therapist who previously volunteered and then worked in the nursery, and we are thrilled to have her back in her new role. It feels as if she has never left! Charlotte's post is currently funded by a grant from BBC Children in Need.

Our new Listening Support Group has continued to go from strength to strength. With pilot funding from Awards for All and Portsmouth NHS Clinical Commissioning Group, we have provided a monthly baby group and a monthly pre-school group which offer support to families of children with a non-aided hearing loss. The children really enjoy their listening exploration and their parents are reporting improved confidence for communication, with the knock-on effect of improved behaviour! With such great results, we hope to continue this valued service in the autumn, subject to securing funding.

Our baby, toddler and pre-school nursery services at our Family Centre have also gone from strength to strength. Throughout the year, we teach the children topical vocabulary (such as transport, minibeasts, Summer, etc) and we try to end the topic with a trip out to help reinforce the vocabulary the children have been learning. This year, we were very lucky to be able to go on a visit to the historic ship HMS Warrior 1860 at the end of our transport topic. What an amazing time the children had! A big thank-you goes to Amanda Collinson (mum to Jacob) for helping to arrange this exciting opportunity for the children.

# Harriet Graham & her family

"Harriet was born by emergency caesarean just a few days before her due date. My placenta came away from my womb just before she was born starving her of oxygen. When Harriet was born she had no signs of life and it took a long time to resuscitate her as she had swallowed so much blood.

"Harriet then spent the next 72 hours 'on ice' having cooling treatment which reduced her core body temperature to 33°C instead of 37°C. This was a really scary and surreal time, and I felt like I was living in a dark tunnel. After coming off life support and initially being tube feed, she started to breastfeed at 7 days old. My relief was enormous as I had imagined she may have had trouble breastfeeding but she was just like a normal baby!

"She had an MRI scan, which showed a left sided Cerebral Infarct; in other words a dead area in her brain, a stroke. She didn't pass her first hearing test, and despite reassurance from friends I knew she was deaf, but I also knew I was very lucky she was alive. After hours and hours of hearing test, she was diagnosed with a moderate to severe high frequency sensori neural hearing loss in both ears, they were 99% sure this was due to the lack of oxygen at birth. She started to wear her pink hearing aids when she was 3 months old.

"The next set of hearing tests showed that her hearing loss was moderate to profound. After several tests with the same results she had Grommets fitted at 18 months as it was suspected that Glue Ear was increasing her hearing loss to profound. Unfortunately the Grommets had no benefit to her hearing loss. So even with her hearing aids she can only hear around 37% of what's being said.

"Despite the brain damage we know Harriet has, she met all her developmental milestones and walked before she was one. Harriet always seems to be the centre of attention, she lights up a room with her smile and personality. She is very happy, cheeky and determined. She is also very lucky to have a patient and protective older sister to copy and learn from.

"My husband Chris is in the Army and when Harriet was 2 and her sister Lizzie 3 we moved to Hampshire. This came after 18 months of not being together as a proper family with Chris in Germany and Afghanistan. We then discovered The Elizabeth Foundation, which has literally changed our lives. The Elizabeth Foundation has not



only given my daughter the ability to be able to listen and talk; but as a family we have also learned so much too. All the teachers, staff and volunteers go the extra mile to support you. If there is something you are worried about, they will point you in the right direction and most importantly make you feel you are not alone.

"Harriet has her first assessment for Cochlear Implants shortly in Southampton, which the staff at The Elizabeth Foundation have helped me research into. There is a possibility of a Hybrid Implant, which is half hearing aid/half implant. This kind of implant has had some success in preserving natural hearing, but it is all very new and she has to have a series of further assessments to determine if this is the best thing for her needs. We do know that with the support of The Elizabeth Foundation we will not feel as alone as to whatever decision we make.

"Harriet has another year left at The Elizabeth Foundation but I know this will not be our end in the involvement, as once you step through the doors of the Foundation you will never be able to say goodbye!"
